

Early Club History

On the 28th October, 1991, the Rotary Club of Wahroonga Inc. forwarded letters to men who they considered may be interested in forming a new Probus Club in the area.

The letter was signed P.S. Langford, Convener, and the invitation was to attend a meeting at the Warrawee Bowling Club on the 25th November, 1991. At this meeting it was agreed that an organisational meeting be held on 16th December, 1991, and this meeting was attended by 56 prospective members with 7 apologies. The meeting was opened by Warren Gibson on behalf of Rotary Club Wahroonga, and it was moved by Bill Artis, and seconded by G. Laxton that a Club to be known as the "Probus Club of Wahroonga East" be formed – carried unanimously.

It was accepted that all persons who had completed an application to join the Club be accepted as Founding Members. The Inaugural meeting was held on the 3rd February, 1992, at St Andrews Church Hall, Wahroonga, at 10am when our Club was officially chartered by President Lionel Lever (President Wahroonga Rotary).

So keen were we on Social outings, a trip on the Hawkesbury River organised on Thursday 30th January, 1992, was attended by 39 members and 38 spouses, before we became official. Now10 years later we are 100 members.

The above is a little of our early history and the following pages list where we have been, what we have done and who was at the helm at the time. We trust that it will bring back some fond memories of what we have done in the past, and whet your appetite for the enjoyable years ahead.

BUSHWALKING

Bushwalking made its first tentative steps on 4th February 1994, when nine walkers met at 3pm in Bogata Street, Cremorne, for a walk around Cremorne Point. Since then ten walks a year have been planned all over Sydney but mainly in the immediate area around our Turramurra base.

There have been exceptions. We have walked in the Eastern Suburbs, along the Northern Beaches, the Central Coast and around the Iron Cove. We have seen the Sydney bush in the Spring, Summer, Autumn and Winter. We have been wet on a couple of occasions, however, we have had mainly good weather and only about ten walks have had to be cancelled due to the weather. We have seen a Water Dragon laying its eggs, a Fairy Penguin swimming in the Harbour, a Goanna barring our path, a Lyre Bird, many other birds and a mother whale and her calf frolicking off Long Reef.

We have had a bit of excitement when the police were looking for a suspected murderer. We have been treated to many delicious home-made cakes and bisuits for our afternoon teas. We even had Champagne on one occasion to celeberate a walker's special birthday. We have never lost a walker, however we have finished with more walkers than we started with. Sometimes plans have had to be changed at the last minute. As an example, when we got soaking wet on the Sydney Harbour Bridge, we found shelter on a Manly ferry, then completed a walk to Fairy Bower. There was also the time when I discovered that the kiosk at Lane Cove National Park would not be open to serve afternoon teas to our walkers. "Operation Mobile Phone" took place, and we had our teas, plus as a bonus, a home made cake! We have had the opportunity to see the Harbour from many different angles. Who could forget the view of the city from Bradleys Head while we had our lunch, or the Heads from Tania Park, Balgowlah Heights.

Nearly all our walks have had three elements – water, bush and pleasant weather. We have walked with as few as four and as many as twenty two fellow companions. We have walked the Sydney Harbour Bridge, the Spit Bridge, Fullers Bridge, De Burghs Bridge, the Iron Cove and Parsley Bay Bridges. We have walked along the Manly Dam wall, under the Roseville Bridge, Northbridge Bridge, Willoughby Road and the Eastern Arterial Road.

I would like to think that we have never been lost but only "geographically embarrassed". Thank you to all the many walkers who have participated.
