



# Reminisces of Twenty Years Enjoyment in our Club

Peter Langford, our first President and convenor, spoke at the ten years Celebratory Dinner giving the highlights of the first ten years of the Club's existence and how the Probus concept had worked so well. In fact in his view the Club had exceeded everyone's expectations in how much its activities played in adding to the life of members retiring from the all-consuming routine of daily work life.

As a fellow charter member, I also attest to the value of the Probus idea of an association of retired people who join together in a club, the basic purpose of which is to provide regular opportunities to keep our minds active, expand our interests and enjoy the fellowship of new friends. The Club quickly became part of my life and continues to be so. Amongst my memories is the very large number of members who have contributed to the Club's success by volunteering their time and skills. Rarely has a member rejected a request to help and then to my knowledge only for an understandable reason. This is a wonderful basis for a great Club of people.

In the early days there were a couple of issues which required debate but these were worked through. One decision was to allow/invite our wives to all our meetings —not common practice in most Probus Clubs then and now. I believe that practice has been a main strength of our club, especially in the success of the social life of the Club. Only recently was I invited to speak to another Probus Club, envious of the success of our many activities, and whilst naturally I gave credit to the calibre of our members I added that the Club owed much to the wholehearted support of our ladies. We continue that approach with our invitation to wives of deceased members to remain connected if they wish to do so. Some do, some do not - over to them. Whatever they do we wish them well.

Our archivist, Ian Davidson, tells me we have lost eighty nine members, many deceased unfortunately - others leaving for a variety of reasons. Incidentally I like the idea of having an archivist for two reasons - one it shows our intention to go on forever and the other in case we forget something that happened in the past. All of the eighty nine have left their mark on the Club but I would like to mention five of them: Max Primrose our first Editor, George Laxton who introduced us to computers, Ray Arthur to investments, Bill Artis Vice President in our first year and President in the following year and Malcolm Stewart Secretary of the Club. I find it interesting that each year about a fifth of the club - twenty members - are involved in various voluntary roles in the Club.



Most of our interest groups have continued to thrive since their gestation at various times of the twenty years. One or two have disappeared whilst others have fluctuated in member interest as we would expect in a live and changing people association. The convenors of the activity groups have therefore been many over the years and every one of them has made a great contribution to the success of our Club. They are too numerous to mention or to single out.

A major decision of the Club after about fifteen years was to encourage future membership to be at a lower age and to show a history of enthusiasm so that they can take over the tasks of leading the Club in future. We, charter members and other long-term members, can now sit back and enjoy the efforts of the 'newies', who already have shown the same willingness and ability to progress the Club as their predecessors. The alternative decision for us was to 'slowly fade away into the west' as some Probus clubs have done and are doing.

So the future of the Club is very sound and we all look forward to many enjoyable Probus years together.

### Bowls

Of the many activities organised within Wahroonga East Probus Club, lawn bowls has played a very strong part during the last 20 years and is now enjoyed by about 40% of our members. Throughout each year, a number of Probus Clubs enter teams in up to six separate invitation days and three inter-club Shield matches. In addition to this, Wahroonga East has its own internal bowling fun day known as St Thongs.

As an example of the strong fraternity, in 2011 108 players from 18 different Probus Clubs, including 35 of our members, played in the various games. With this number of events, all interested bowlers have an opportunity to participate and it is obvious that bowls will continue to maintain its popularity as a well-supported Club activity.

The major bowls event is the Probus Shield, first introduced and sponsored by Westpac in 1987. After a short time, Westpac ceased its association, sponsorship was then picked up by Prudential, who maintained support for another five years. Following this, and in the absence of any further external assistance, the event simply became known as 'The Probus Shield'.

This annual inter-club event is now in its 25th Jubilee year. From an original twelve participating clubs, it has grown to fourteen in friendly competition on the greens and hosted by the previous year's winner. In the last ten years, Wahroonga East has won the trophy on four occasions - 2002, 2007, 2008 and 2010. It was hoped we would retain the Shield in 2011 but it was not to be. This event is also healthy, well supported and should continue to be a competitive activity within the Probus organization.

The internal fun game known as 'St Thongs', is a pairs format played each year by Wahroonga East Probus members. 2012 will be the 7th year for this prestigious and highly regarded trophy, played between a side selected from Warrawee Bowling Club members and a composite St Thongs side from St Ives, Turramurra, Hornsby, Newport and Gordon Bowling Clubs.

Another activity we all enjoy within the Club is 'Trips & Tours'. One short trip in particular not only provides travel to a holiday location, but allows members to pursue their favourite activity in the company of fellow members. This is now in its fourth year and we have so far enjoyed this pleasant 3 day outing at Bowral. Our bowlers, hosted by a nearby bowling club, have been teamed with the local men and women on the greens, followed by lunch provided by the lady members. Be it to Bowral or some other suitable location in the future, these small excursions have been so successful that their continuation is assured.

Looking back over the years, Wahroonga East Probus bowlers can be proud that they have played a strong part in furthering the close fellowship with other Probus Clubs; this augers well for the future.

## Golf

In plotting the progress of golf over our 20-year history, it is significant that the emphasis has always been on enjoyment. Stories related over lunch after each game have given praise to good results, even if they were qualified by remarks relative to the winners handicap and where on earth it came from and perhaps what would be more appropriate for next month's game. However this was always done in good fun and most banter was directed to individual events that brought either joy or despair as that little white ball did strange things after leaving the golf club - sometimes never to be seen again.

Golf is a great game for a club such as ours because is doesn't matter whether you are a regular club comp player or an occasional hacker, we all have fun together and it is the fellowship enjoyed on the day that brings us back together the following month.

The first outing of Probus golfers was at Narellan on 13th September 1993 and since then regular monthly (almost) games have been played at a wide range of quality courses over the past 20 years. From time to time the ladies have joined to keep us men honest and the most regular players have been Judy Marriott and Rosemary Hobbs. Visitors have always been welcome and good associations have been formed which have led to new memberships.

Statistics relative to our group are interesting. Over the first ten years the best score of 47 stable ford points was carded by Alec Wannan while since then the best has been 46 points by Ian Cameron. Howard Gardner gets the nod for consistency as a regular top three finisher and scored 44 points during both the first and second halves of our history.

John Sim and Bill Locke performed strongly over the first half and recorded 45 and 43 points respectively. David Hobbs and Dick Stone scored 44 and 43 points during the second half and both were well placed over the full 20 years.

One pleasing factor throughout our golf games has been the variation in winners and the quite unique situation that over eight games pass without repetition in placings.

A highlight to the clubs sporting calendar over the last three years has been outings to Bowral and our golfers have enjoyed play at Bowral Golf Club. The ladies came out in force and frankly gave the men a golf lesson. Lunch provided by the club in the most tranquil bush setting at the 10th tee has become the signature event of the day.

While participation over the first half recorded numbers between 20 and 25 per game and there has been a fall to 16 and 20 starters over the second half, many earlier players have turned to bowls and keep up the sporting spirit of our club.

It must be recorded that David Mitchell, who founded our golfing outings, ran these events for 14 years in a most outstanding way and has been the inspiration that has kept golf alive in Probus today. He has never missed a game and our golfers have a very big "thank you " to him for all his help throughout our history.





# **Outings**

There were five convenors for Outings and Functions in the decade: Ken Conwell, Hugh Anderson, Geoff Morris, Ian Maze and Peter Booth.

Lists of outings and functions appear in the year pages of this publication, so repetition of the list here is unnecessary.

Outings were ad hoc, of course, and the scope and range of them is a tribute to the inventiveness of the convenors. An inspection of the list of adventures shows how much we embraced this great city and hinterland of ours, enjoying them to the full and continuing to learn. In recent years the outings have been scheduled for the Friday after our monthly Probus meeting; this has helped to increase the numbers going on the outings.

We cruised wherever it was possible to cruise, day and evening; we visited every important garden; we delved into our history, visiting stately buildings, museums, old settlements like Joadja Creek, Newington Armoury, Bare Island fort, Parramatta and sighting Aboriginal rock carvings. We inspected important institutions like Lucas Heights, specialist units within important hospitals, State Parliament, the State Library, UTS, Olympic Park, the ABC, Garden Island, NRMA Careflight, Williamtown air base and RAAF Richmond. We learned from visits to Industry: Port Kembla, Newcastle, the then-new John Fairfax print facility at Chullora, the Qantas air base and the Kurnell oil refinery. We visited exotic places such as Cabramatta and Chinatown and marvelled at how diverse this city of ours is. We inspected the Britannia State Coach and saw just how good our Australian dexterity can be. We ate meals in many unusual surroundings. And there was considerably more, all undertaken with the feeling of warmth that being inside our special Wahroonga East cocoon engenders.

During the decade, five regular functions became, or continued to be, part of the club's life. Chronologically they are:

• The Bobbin Head Barbecue: Taking everything with us except the kitchen sink, we gather at the barbecues at Bobbin Head at around Australia Day each year. In addition to cooking our own meals, we have great fun just socialising and sharing nibbles (and anecdotes) for an evening. In the last few years, various speakers were asked to address the group on the subject of "What does Australia Day mean to me?" All speakers so far have been excellent and go to prove yet again how diverse a group we are.



- The Progressive Dinner: This event is well attended each year. Initially, the event was held in winter, with guests visiting one host for entrée before driving to have main course with another before all participants went to meet at a central point for dessert and coffee. Towards the end of the decade, it was felt that making four car trips on a winter's evening was undesirable so the time changed to March and the entrees and main courses were chez the same hosts.
- The Mid-Year Lunch (formerly Christmas In July): Normally is held in June or July at a nice venue where members dress in jacket and tie and enjoy each other's company whilst partaking of fine food and wines. Comfort food.
- *The Prawn Lunch:* A much more casual affair. The usual venue is the Ku-ring-gai Wildflower Garden in November; the fare is peel-yourself prawns (or chicken) with salad and desserts and a fine time is had by all. In a way it seems to signal the advent of the Christmas season and the atmosphere reflects that.
- The Christmas Lunch: This is the main event of the year and is the function that attracts the highest number of participants. The members and their ladies dress nicely and it is held at a prestigious location each year. # **Long Tours**

During 2002 Raoul Desoe looked after Long Tours.

We used Scenic Tours those days and we modified one of their standard Tasmanian Tours by staying longer in fewer hotels, eliminating the need to have "cases out by 7.30 am " every morning. This made our Probians' trip in March that year a very relaxed and enjoyable trip.

Following this approach, our next Long Tour was to Merimbula in late October '02, where we stayed at the just refurbished Black Dolphin motel for four nights, making day trips, boat trips and even managed to make time for a game of golf at the Pambula Golf course with Scenic Tours providing trophies. When this trip was announced, the interest was overwhelming. Instead of a large waiting list, we finished up with two of Scenic's coaches full with 80 Probians and wives.

Keith Galloway succeeded Raoul Desoe and handled Long Tours from April 2003 to May 2008.

During that period, there were 13 Tours ranging in length from 2 to 16 days. All were within Australia; North West almost as far as you could go; West into the Centre of Australia and South along the coastline.

The tours just emphasise the vastness and contrast of our country. The uniqueness of Lightning Ridge, the history of the Murray River, the fascination of a two-night stay in the Underground Motel at White Cliffs, Arkaroola and the Ridge top Tour to Sillers Lookout, Innaminka where the population varies from 14-16 and is steeped in Burke and Wills history, Birdsville and the red sand dunes at the commencement of the Simpson Desert, Ray Station and the history of the Tully and Durack families, the ruggedness and beauty of the Kimberleys, walking in to Mitchell Falls before flying out by helicopter, walking through the Bungle Bungles and then viewing them from a helicopter. These are only a few of the highlights but each Tour had one thing in common. We travelled with friends, some old friends and some new friends who would become old friends.

Until members participate in a Probus Wahroonga East Tour they will not know this experience. Tours are the quickest way to get to know your fellow Probians and the experience should be on the agenda of all new members and also older members who have not experienced a Tour.

Geoff Morris succeeded Keith Galloway and handled Long Tours from May 2008 to March 2012.

Two new innovations were introduced during this period. Ian Maze (then handling Outings) introduced three-day Canberra/Port Stephens trips which have proven to be popular each year and Hugh Anderson (then President) introduced the concept of a self-drive three-day sporting stay at Bowral, which again is extremely well supported in September each year.

Over the 2008-2011 period, a total of fourteen Tours were enjoyed: Four Canberra/Port Stephens; three Bowral, one Kimberley (led by Keith Galloway), three Australian coach tours (New England, Tropical North Queensland and Orange), one Norfolk Island and two Asian Tours (Vietnam/Cambodia and China/Singapore). A Sydney/Sydney cruise around New Zealand was enjoyed by 20 people in February/March 2012.

The two Asian Tours were very successful. We were fortunate to have excellent and empathetic guides and the itineraries were fascinating. A group book was produced for each Tour, and should make interesting reading when future Tours like that are being planned.

Roy Lawrence had a long and distinguished role in managing the Theatre Outings until I took over at the beginning of 2010. Writing in the 10 year history Roy said "A survey of members in our first year had shown some interest in theatre-going. Past President Roy Lawrence with the President Tony Tinworth's support, decided to test out this interest and organised a theatre night at the Marion Street Theatre to see – "No Names No Pack Drill".

From these humble beginnings Theatre Outings are now a core activity which is well supported by most members. Theatre outings to the City or other major destinations have an average attendance of 40 members and their guests. They enjoy a bus ride in free from the hassles of parking with good interaction both on the way in and after the shows. To liven up things on the way in, most members enjoy a glass of champagne with some cheese and biscuits while the non-drinkers partake of some orange juice. Surprising how the orange juice gets everyone talking.

Apart from the City shows, we also continue to support the two local amateur theatre groups, The Willoughby Musical Society which produces a fine range of three musicals each year and Pymble Players which provides a varied assortment of four live drama productions each year. Both groups offer a very high standard of entertainment despite their amateur status. Around 50 members continue to support Pymble Players each year with around 20 members supporting the Willoughby Theatre.

The bus outings are selected so they offer a variety of entertainment ranging from major leading musical productions to drama and circus performances. The selections are aimed at catering to as wide a range of tastes as possible, so that as many members as possible have an opportunity to participate. From approximately two outings a year we now have approximately five bus outings a year.

I must express my thanks to the many willing assistants who provide me waiter services on the bus serving the drinks and in particular Hugh Anderson, Ian Cameron and David Mitchell who are always ready and willing to assist.

We have made up for it since, with over forty dine-outs in the following eleven years. It is hardly surprising that the original organising team of the Craigs and Lawrences have continuously eaten and imbibed in our Club's interests and made no effort to pass the 'task' onto others. They have appreciated suggestions from members but have somehow endured the onerous responsibility to choose the right place. We have dined at over twenty five restaurants ranging from Pymble and Castlecrag to Mt Colah and Terry Hills- each one meticulously examined before acceptance. Over the years the C's and L's have been out dining/testing many many times -not always successfully- there have been many disappointments; there are some 'tired' eating places around our area. There have been two outings with over 90 participants and one of those, Costis at St Ives, is still remembered by many. The arrangement of good seafood with a fascinating old-timers jazz band was simply great and was repeated twice afterwards. Another over eighty diners was at Christina's at Castlecrag although we are still not sure whether it was the Lebanese food or the belly dancer was the star attraction. Twice we have combined with the Outings group in providing FW&D with a Hawkesbury cruise and then at Georges Head with an escorted look at the old army tunnels followed by lunch at the Barracks Restaurant. We have not exceeded a cost of \$40 at any FW&D and that figure has only applied in up-market places, mainly French. As expected Chinese, Italian and Thai cuisines have been the most visited but others have included Japanese, Korean, Goanese, German, Lebanese and Greek. We often speak with the Chef to find his favourites before finalising the menu. Naturally hard bargaining is a requisite for the task to keep costs down, although admittedly the final mention of cash payments (no messy credit cards) has given our bargaining strength an edge.
